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Tweedsmuir's Accessibility Project

In 2014, in response to the growing need at Tweedsmuir to provide easier access to all floors and to address Ontario's Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA), Tweedsmuir undertook an ambitious Accessibility project. Under the leadership of Ron Mikulik and John Ritchie, an Accessibility Committee was struck and plans were formulated. Local architectural firm Dickinson + Hicks was hired to create the preliminary drawings and assist with the tender process. Lohr Building Contractors was selected to do the work because of their competitive quote and the fact that they have installed lifts in dozens of churches in Southern Ontario.

Tweedsmuir's Accessibility project includes the installation of a lift just inside the north entrance and minor renovations to the entrance including making the doors automatic. A wheelchair accessible washroom will be constructed in the lower level using part of the Zion room ("pie room"), and the existing washrooms will be upgraded. Finally, the dais will be extended to include a platform that will raise the piano making musicians more visible and audible from all points in the sanctuary.

The total cost of the project is \$203,000.00. Fundraising is ongoing and donations continue to be gratefully received. The congregation, in full support of this progressive project, voted to approve the allocation of some of its own resources (\$65,000). An additional \$50,000 has been contributed by an anonymous donor from Tweedsmuir - amazing generosity! Funding proposals originally written and submitted by the Accessibility Committee in 2014, were updated and resubmitted and, thankfully, the church was approved for two major grants: Enabling Accessibility Fund (\$50,000) and New Horizons for Seniors Program (\$25,000). The Accessibility Committee also applied to the Presbyterian Building Corporation and was approved for an interest free loan of up to \$100,000 ensuring that there will be ample funding for the work being undertaken. There will be a general plaque acknowledging the generosity of our congregation as a whole and there will also be an opportunity for people to donate in thanksgiving or as a memorial to a loved one. These donations will be commemorated with individual plaques.

The Accessibility Committee would like to thank the congregation for their steadfast support of this wonderful project. A celebration and ribbon cutting is being planned for the completed project expected to take place in December. Committee members include Ron Mikulik, John Ritchie, Bob Hunt, Rod Ryner and Ellen Sinclair. It has surely been a labour of love...and very upLIFTing!
